What is SOCVOC?

SOCial VOCational, SOCVOC, is a start-up European project in which educators from five different countries make their best practices and creative training available to prisoners in an open, digital learning environment and by giving training and presentations at various events.

The core of the project is to develop an easy-to-use guidebook consisting of good practices of methodologies of learning social skills to low-skilled adult learners while they are learning a profession and train the teachers how to use this information available on the project website. And at the same time offering exercise opportunities, digital and non-digital, on the matter to the learners in prison. In this way they can get started with the processing of the social skills, combined with getting to know a digital environment and starting to use it. Second multiplier event in Tallinn

On October 10th 2023, the partnership had the second multiplier event, organized by Tallinn Construction school (Estonia), to promote the project results of the ERASMUS+ SOCVOC project. The event aimed to showcase the outcomes of working package 2 (WP2) and highlighted the importance of social skills in prison vocational education.



The event attracted a diverse audience, including teachers, counsellors, prison gards & directors, social workers and other stakeholders from Tallinn and nearby cities. The event was designed as a conference that brought together all stakeholders related to prison education in Estonia. Also the Estonian branche of the EPEA (www.epea.eu) participated in this meeting which served as a network event to exchange new ideas.

The event's success was evident through the enthusiastic engagement of the presenters and attendees. The audience displayed a genuine interest in the project's outcomes with hands-on materials for teachers of vocational education in prison. The keynote speaker Siivi Hansen gave the participants information about crucial aspects of lifelong learning and the need to improve social competences of inmates and combating stereotypes in prison. During the workshops in small groups, the stakeholders themselves contributed to

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finding solutions to improve the educational environment in prison. The keynote speaker Angela Allik of the Tallinn prison gave the audience more insights in the effects of education as a factor in reducing recidivism. The multiplier event hosted a Norwegian keynote speaker, Mare Lilleorg, who shared good practices from the prison of Agder (Norway) about social skills development of prisoners.

At the end of the multiplier event, the engaged audience's reflected on this meeting and shared commitment to promote the improvement of social skills of prisoners in vocational training. Through the collaborative efforts of the stakeholders of the partnership SOCVOC, the researchers and teachers collected the feedback of this conference for the next steps in working packages 3 & 4.



Task sheets for teachers related to the 21st century life skills

The opportunities and needs to communicate with others around the world are changing rapidly. Therefore the social skills of prisones will need to be improved accordingly by learning to use new tools, how to build relationships and to be successful in work and in life in the 21st century. The ERASMUS+ partnership SOCVOC has elaborated 15 task sheets for teachers related to these 21st century skills. These task sheets can be used in a common methodology during vocational training where students have alos exercises on one of the topics in the tabel underneath.
